Subject/Grade: Grade One Lesson Title: All About Penguins Teacher(s): Kailee Le Drew

Stage 1: Identify Desired Results

Content:

This is a literacy lesson all about penguins! The students will learn about penguins, and then practice printing and forming sentences. First, I will read a book to the class called "Little Penguin" by Johnathan London to get the children engaged. Then, as a class we will brainstorm some things that penguins can/have/are into a graphic organizer. The students will then take these brainstormed words and turn them into sentences about penguins in their "All About Penguins" booklet activity.

Outcome(s):

CR1.3: Listen to and comprehend a variety of texts (including a book read aloud, a person speaking, and directions) to retell the sequences and key points.

CC1.4: Write and share stories and short informational texts about familiar events and experiences in a minimum of 5 sentences.

Indicator(s):

- Write about familiar topics using the learned vocabulary to express ideas.
- Write brief explanations and descriptions (accompanied by pictures) of real objects, persons, and places.
- Write about familiar topics using the learned vocabulary to express ideas.
- Attempt to choose interesting words in independent writing.
- Listen to and carry out directions with four to six simple steps.

Key Understandings: ('I Can' statements)

- I can describe the parts of a penguin.
- I can describe the features of a penguin.
- I can write a full sentence.
- I can trace and cut shapes.
- I can glue the parts of a penguin where they belong.

Key Questions:

- What is a penguin?
- What types of things can penguins do?
- What are some physical features of a penguin?
- How can I write a descriptive sentence about a penguin?

Prerequisite Learning:

- Printing and spelling (may need some spelling help from teacher)
- What penguins are, what features they have, and what they can do
- Tracing shapes, cutting, and gluing

Stage 2: Determine Evidence for Assessing Learning

I will look over the student's booklets and provide a scribe for their sentences if needed.

Stage 3: Build Learning Plan

Length of Time: 10 mins

Set (Engagement):

- Ask the children to share what they already know about penguins.
 Read the book "Little Penguin" by Johnathan London aloud to the

Development:

Length of Time: 25 mins

- Give each student a graphic organizer with the categories HAVE, CAN, ARE on it.
- Make your own organizer on the whiteboard so that the students can follow along easier.
- Discuss with the children what they learned during the "Little Penguin" story.
- Ask the children:
 - 1. What do penguins have?
 - 2. What can penguins do?
 - 3. What are penguins?
- Have the students write the answers down on their organizers.
 Expect answers such as:
 - 1. HAVE: webbed feet, wings, feathers, blubber
 - 2. CAN: hunt, dive, slide
 - 3. ARE: tall, smart, birds
- The students demonstrate their learning by turning descriptive words about penguins into sentences in an "All About Penguins" booklet.
- Each booklet page will prompt the student with "Penguins have"
 (are, can). From there they will create a sentence such as
 "Penguins have blubber and feathers to keep them warm" and print
 it on the lines on the page.
- The students will then draw and colour a picture that resembles the sentence that they wrote for each page.

Learning Closure:

Length of Time: 10 mins

- Students will trace a beak and feet onto orange paper and cut it out, as well as trace eyes onto white paper and cut it out.
- They will then glue the feet, beak, and eyes onto the cover page of their booklet to make the cover look like a penguin.

Materials/Resources:

- Black, orange and white construction paper
- Pencil
- Scissors
- Glue stick
- Stapler
- Pencil crayons, crayons, or markers
- "Little Penguin" book by Johnathan London
- "All about Penguins" booklets and graphic organizers

Advanced Preparation:


- Print out the booklets and graphic organizers


